For anyone following the issue of the Rev. Gretta Vosper, the atheist United Church minister who is currently under review for her suitability for ministry because of her beliefs, you may know that at least a couple of times in the last year, she has referenced the United Church group "Cruxifusion." She described it as "on the extreme right wing" in one post, and in another claims the members are more

conservative than one of the organizations that originally founded it, the Community of Concern.

Some of you will also know that I am part of this group and have attended two Cruxifusion conferences using my continuing education allowance (thank you!). I have also never in my entire life considered myself right wing, nor would many people who have had anything longer than a 5 minute conversation with me, or spent ANY time at all on my Facebook page!

This article is not written against Vosper, but I do want to clarify that while Cruxifusion arose out of some groups that I would have considered too conservative to be part of (case in point: Community of Concern, among other things, was opposed to ordaining LGBTQ folks and marrying them), it is a whole 'nother creation. Some people in it are quite theologically conservative. Others, like myself, are quite theologically liberal/progressive. There are straight people, gay people, people of different races and ages. A number of members refer to God in traditional ways and as "He." Some of us call God "She" or "He" or simply, God.

Why are we all together in this one group? We are all people within the United Church who consider ourselves "Christ-centred." I believe this might even mean different things to different people in the group! To me, it means

that there is something inside of me that is captivated by the story of God taking human form in Jesus, loving the world so much and in such a terrifyingly authentic, antiestablishment and counter-cultural way that the world killed Jesus on the cross. And then, somehow, someway, Jesus the Christ walked among his followers after he died, and I love that it was women who saw him first. Christ was alive again, somehow, someway, in spirit and in truth and in experience. This part of the story does not make sense in my brain. But it captures my heart, and opens it, and lives in it, and makes me feel connected to the Holy Spirit and the world and gives me hope that good will always triumph over evil.

And yet life today is still messed up, and still glorious, and as a mentor of mine once said in all seriousness in a funeral sermon about a particularly devastating death, sometimes without a reason "shit happens." We live in a hurting world that paradoxically has been healed through the cross, and is still healing and yet to be healed. Time bends in on itself, and something that happened 2000 years is still happening, and still yet to happen. And it happens every time we feed the hungry, care for the vulnerable among us, serve those in need, and show and receive love in spite of ourselves.

Because somehow, someway, this Christ - this saviour, messiah - showed us how to live, broke something in how death worked and healed life in the process.

Chelsea initially posted a slightly different version of this on Facebook, realized the congregation might also be interested in learning more about Cruxifusion, and adapted it for our newsletter.

We will share our stories about why we give; how our generosity makes a difference here at Westminster United Church; how we affect the community around us; and how, through the Mission & Service of the United Church, we respond to this call nationally and globally. Salt and Light will be the theme of our worship with learning opportunities for all ages. It will be the focus of our worship services, Sunday school and outreach during the last of October and into November. Also we will invite you to join us in giving to this ministry where you feel you are able.

It is going to be an inspiring experience. Listen for your own call, and respond with generosity!

The Season of Advent

The season of Advent will soon be upon us. Advent begins on Sunday, November 27th. The theme for this year will be <u>"The Magnificat"</u>, and we will be exploring ways in which to magnify the Lord in our lives.

The Magnificat, taken from Luke's Gospel (1: 46-55), is the Blessed Virgin Mary's hymn of praise to the Lord. Although the Magnificat has had numerous musical settings from such composers as Palestrina, Bach and Mozart, it can be recited as well as sung. Its name comes from the first line of its text in Latin ("Magnificat anima mea Dominum") translated in the first line below. Mary proclaims the Lord's greatness with characteristic humility and grace here:

My soul magnifies the Lord And my spirit rejoices in God my Saviour; Because He has regarded the lowliness of His handmaid; For behold, henceforth all generations shall call me blessed; Because He who is mighty has done great things for me, and holy is His name; And His mercy is from generation to generation on those who fear Him. He has shown might with His arm, He has scattered the proud in the

conceit of their heart.

He has put down the mighty from their thrones, and has exalted the lowly. He has filled the hungry with good things, And the rich He has sent away empty. He has given help to Israel, his servant, mindful of His mercy, Even as He spoke to our fathers, to Abraham and to his posterity forever.
